
Mobile Broadband Communications at LARC April Meeting

It was awesome watching the project go from bare walls to what it is today. The entire time I was working, I thought the benefit was that we were completing the trailer. What I found out was that the real benefit was the fellowship with other Hams.

I have had the pleasure to get to know many of our fellow Club members through my few years with the Club and what I have found is that they are some of the nicest people you will meet anywhere. They are willing to sacrifice their free time to help with projects the Club has, and also events that we do for the community. Many have helped give presentations at Club meetings and others have helped coordinate our activities or call the various Nets we participate in. Without the hard work of the fellow Hams that I have come to know, we would not have been able to accomplish all of the things that we set out to complete.

This type of commitment does not stop with our Club here in Lenoir. I have had this exact same experience with many of the people I have came in contact with in our neighboring clubs. Thirty Years Ago: April 1986...

The April 1986 newsletter sported a new masthead proclaiming the newly formed "Lenoir Amateur Radio Club" voted on at the last meeting. The Newsletter became the "official" club bulletin and will be sent to all club members as a part of the benefits of belonging to the Club.

The Club elected its first officers: Jim Rogers President, Duane Ayers, Vice President, and Susan N4OJN Secretary-Treasurer. Member dues were set as single membership fee \$10, and a family \$15. Only members would receive the newsletter, except some complimentary copies would be sent to neighboring clubs. Those joining the Club in the first 2-3 months will be designated "charter" members, hopefully with special benefits to come as the years roll by.

The next few months will be spent on developing bylaws, club policies, repeater, etc., and all votes by members will be majority rules. The initial group beginning for work on the formation of the club was about 17-20 persons.

And, a carload of these new members were off to the Charlotte Hamfest, were they dropped "five big ones" on a bunch of ham goodies--James N4NIN picked up a new 70 watt Kenwood 2-meter mobile! Upon arriving home from the Hamfest, Susan N4OJN found her brand spanking new Novice license waiting for her.

The first Club president spoke those notable words to be repeated by every president that followed: "We can't run a club by ourselves, please let any or all of the officers know your interests, desires, gripes, etc." And, as meeting planning began, ideas were sought for interesting programs on timely subjects such as RTTY, Amtor, PACKET, computers and other forms of "exotic" communications.


Trailer Work Continues!
